What really matters?

One of the things my dad and I used to do together was watch television. Some of the shows we liked were The Andy Griffith Show, The Waltons, Emergency, and Sanford & Son. WKRP in Cincinnati and M*A*S*H were two of our all-time favorites. All of The Three Stooges and Little Rascals shows made us laugh (they still do make me laugh). And then there were Saturday morning cartoons. There's nothing like watching Bugs Bunny with your dad. It's even better when he laughs as much as you do.

I was watching a rerun of a M*A*S*H episode recently. That show went off the air in 1983. Forty years later, it's still classic television. One of the characters on that show that I pay attention to more now is one who was not a main character. He wasn't in every storyline. It wasn't until later years that he had more of a part in the stories and interactions with the other characters. That character I've come to appreciate is Father Mulcahey, the chaplain for the 4077th.

Father Francis Mulcahey was a genuinely good, kind, and thoughtful man and a dedicated minister. He cared about the staff and the people they took care of. He attended to the wounded in the ways he could and learned how to do things to assist the medical staff that were not likely things he would have ever been taught in seminary. He extended his care to the Korean families and the children of a nearby orphanage, offering whatever extra assistance he could muster up and share. Sometimes he was perplexed by the shenanigans of the personnel. Other times he understood them quite well. He tried his best to be a thoughtful and calm presence in chaotic, precarious, and dangerous circumstances.

I was watching an episode recently in which Father Mulcahey finds that he has placed his need to impress a visiting cardinal from the Catholic church above his call to serve others and to serve God. He becomes furious with the camp personnel when they fail to behave well in front of the cardinal. But, while berating one of the doctors for their seeming lack of concern, he learns that the doctor has just had to tell one of their patients that he has leukemia, which in the early 1950's was an incurable cancer. Father Mulcahey apologizes for his lack of understanding and compassion, and goes to the patient, sitting with and talking with him throughout the night. He realizes how foolish he had been, how wrong he had been to care about things that didn't really matter when faced with the harsh reality of a young man's certain death.

As a pastor, I know quite well how easy it is to be distracted by stuff and chores and all the things that vie for my attention and take time and energy--things that don't always deserve those precious resources. And I am grateful when someone or something reminds me when I need to take a step back, re-assess, and re-focus. I need to ask myself the question: what truly matters?

What truly matters? It's a good question to keep close at hand, I think. But I don't think the answer is much more complicated than living and loving as Jesus taught us to.

God, help us to keep that in mind when we come face-to-face with the question of what truly matters.

The Diamond Eye by Kate Quinn Monday, October 16, 2023

With **The Diamond Eye**, Kate Quinn returns to the fertile storytelling terrain of World War II for a tale inspired by the extraordinary life of Russian sniper Lyudmila "Mila" Pavlichenko, known as "Lady Death." Mila becomes a mother at 15; six years later, amid an impending divorce, she promises her son that she'll teach him to shoot. In between working on her dissertation at Kiev University and raising Alexei, she finds that she's brilliant with a rifle. When the Nazis invade the Soviet Union, her elite skill becomes a key asset in the Red Army's fight to defend the motherland. Mila sets off for war and marches into her own legend.

In each of her novels, Quinn displays an innate awareness of how history can be warped by time and power. In **The Diamond Eye**, we don't just follow Mila's journey into war; we see her actions in sharp contrast to what the Soviet government will later say she's done. Mila's perceptions of events are shown in relief to those of the men around her, and even to the perceptions of the American public, thanks to a 1942 press tour hosted by first lady Eleanor Roosevelt. That press tour forms the novel's narrative spine, unfolding in sections that alternate with Mila's larger wartime odyssey. This structure steadily ratchets up the suspense as it becomes clear that Mila is not as welcome in the U.S. as she was led to believe.

The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek by Kim Michele Richardson

The Page Turners will meet on in the Comfort Shaw room to discuss the bestselling historical fiction novel from Kim Michele Richardson. This is a novel following Cussy Mary, a packhorse librarian and her quest to bring books to the Appalachian community she loves. The hardscrabble folks of Troublesome Creek have to scrap for everything—everything except books, that is. Thanks to Roosevelt's Kentucky Pack Horse Library Project, Troublesome's got its very own traveling librarian, Cussy Mary Carter. Cussy's not only a book woman, however, she's also the last of her kind, her skin a shade of blue unlike most



anyone else. Not everyone is keen on Cussy's family or the Library Project, and a Blue is often blamed for any whiff of trouble. If Cussy wants to bring the joy of books to the hill folks, she's going to have to confront prejudice as old as the Appalachians and suspicion as deep as the holler. Inspired by the true blue-skinned people of Kentucky and the brave and dedicated Kentucky Pack Horse library service of the 1930s, *The Book Woman of Troublesome Creek* is a story of raw courage, fierce strength, and one woman's belief that books can carry us anywhere—even back home.



Church Quarterly Meeting Update

We held our quarterly meeting September 24th. Thanks to all who brought a dish to share and for those who served lunch. We kept the meeting short, but covered some important business.

- We reviewed the 2024 budget that was approved by the Leadership Team at their September 11th meeting. The budget for next year is set at \$192,887. It is a very realistic budget, reflecting what operating costs are projected to be for the coming year. That budget will be submitted at our Charge Conference October 8th. If you would like a copy of the budget, please contact Pastor Lynnette.
- A subcommittee of the Leadership Team has been working with Gasperson Realty to enter into a partnership to lease some of the church's underused spaces. Several months of conversations and exploration of best/practical uses brought the Leadership Team to a decision to pursue renting some of our spaces. Contracts should be signed in October and Gasperson will begin marketing those spaces to find potential long-term tenants. We will keep you updated as tenants are found and spaces are used.
- We went over some of the events planned in coming months for the church. Look for information on these in your weekly announcements and in our newsletters.

The Donnithorne Family in Kenya

...serving as medical missionaries at Tenwek Hospital in western Kenya

Nancy Hiley's nephew, Jeff Donnithorne, promised to share his accounts of their missionary experience, and we have promised in turn to pray for them faithfully as they seek God's will in this unfamiliar setting. We've finished our first full week at Tenwek, and we're grateful for the loving community and the important work to be done in this beautiful place. Katherine begins her work at the hospital tomorrow (Monday), so this upcoming week will inaugurate the new normal.... Please pray for Katherine's health, as she's been fighting travel-induced congestion and coughing for over 2 weeks now.



This past week, many of our first impressions congealed into patterns... our fellow missionaries continued to be wonderfully hospitable, kind, and helpful. The kids expanded and deepened their friendship network, enjoying more outside freedom, with more layers of mud and grime to show for it.



...shopping here is a mosaic, with separate boutique vendors meeting varied needs. This week, our grocery shopping included eggs from a lady at a stall near our house,, fresh milk and homemade ugali corn chips from Eunice, fruits and vegetables from a Wednesday market near the hospital, a grocery store order placed on WhatsApp to be picked up by a fellow missionary, and items from 4-5 different shops or market stalls in Bomet (left). Soon, we'll be placing our first meat delivery order with a Nairobi butcher, whose trucks make deliveries here monthly.

Yesterday, we joined some other missionary families for a hike across the river, along some local roads, to a natural spring. Surrounded by lush green hillsides, patchworked with tea and maize fields, we quickly found ourselves a spectacle for local Kenyan children. Like a snowball rolling downhill, our traveling party grew ever larger, swarmed by local boys eager to try on sunglasses, ask for our watches, touch blonde hair, or experiment with English.







Soon, two herders and 3 cows stumbled down the hill to join the motley congregants at the spring, adding their own fragrant bulk to our party. While this was a hike like no other for us, the only thing the Kenyan men, boys, herders, and cows likely found novel was the rowdy arrival of a dozen wazungu (white people) at their spring!
